

Pastoral Letter

Maureen's Ramblings.....

Agatha Christie's play "The Mousetrap" opened in 1952. 69 years ago!! It keeps going because there is an agreement that those who have seen it will not tell others who dunnit! What a spoiler it would be if everyone knew the ending. This is one of the problems of Easter. We know the end of the story! We know Jesus does not end up dead, lying in the tomb forever. We know that death is defeated and that love cannot be crucified. This is good, astounding and wonderful news! But because we know the ending and the story is so familiar - we stop being surprised by God at Easter. "So what?"

"So what?" Our world is not always a happy or hopeful place and the past months have been especially tough. Life can be painful and difficult and I guess that every home in our area, including in mine, there has been some experience of suffering, pain and death - some "Good Friday" experience. Maybe when I mention the transforming love and hope of the Risen Christ you will say "So what?". You may be feeling that it's always Good Friday, but I can proclaim with as-

surance – Easter can bring us all alive!

Dolly Parton has written a song called "He's Alive" – check it out on YouTube. The last verses are:

But suddenly the air was filled With a strange and sweet perfume

Light that came from everywhere

Drove shadows from the room And Jesus stood before me With his arms held open wide And I fell down on my knees And I just clung to him and cried

Then he raised me to my feet And as I looked into his eyes The love was shining out from him

Like sunlight from the skies Guilt in my confusion Disappeared in sweet release And every fear I ever had Just melted into peace

The song ends - He's alive, yes he's alive, yes he's alive and I'm forgiven, Heaven's gates are open wide.

The disciples on that first Easter morning did not know the end of the story. Jesus was dead.

Their experience was of endings, lostness, despair, hopelessness and grief. Resurrection! This just isn't possible! I wonder if this is how you feel? Maybe your faith has been wounded. Maybe all you can see is death; all you feel is despair and emptiness? Maybe your tears have blinded you to the great truth of the Christian faith or have stopped you believing the possibility that **Christ is risen!** He is here! Alleluia!

Easter gives us the hope that these Good Friday experiences in our lives are not the last word. In the risen Jesus, there is light in the darkness; there is hope for the hopeless; there is love for the unloved; there is peace for the disturbed; there is a rainbow in the rain. Joy does follow tears. There is new life following death. Emptiness and despair was not the end of the story for those first disciples, nor is it for us. Jesus came to them just as he still comes to us, time after time, whispering our name and offering us his love.

I hope you have a blessed and surprising Easter.

A Message from Richard Gamble Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

Hello April!

There are many quotes about this season that I love. One of my favourites is by Harriet Ann Jacobs:

"The beautiful spring came; and when Nature resumes her loveliness, the human soul is apt to revive also."

I cannot remember a time when a revival of the soul is more needed than this spring. Dare we dream of our release from lockdown? Meeting friends and family? Going places? Eating out? Shopping? Even holidays?

There are many historical analogies that have been quoted for what we have suffered. The worst pandemic since the Spanish Flu of 1918 -21. The greatest leap in public debt since the Second World War. The biggest drop in economic productivity since the Great Depression. We survived all of those and historically even worse - even the Great Plague of 1665 and the Black Death of 1346 to 1353, which was the worst pandemic in human history.

In that context, I am impressed that Geoffrey Chaucer wrote The Canterbury Tales quite soon after the Black Death, yet his stories are immensely positive, characterful and racy! The Prologue starts delightfully:

Whan that Aprille with his shoures soote, The droghte of March hath perced to the roote, And bathed every veyne in swich licour Of which vertú engendred is the flour ...

I must apologise for the spelling, but Chaucer was writing in "Middle English". The verses refer, eventually, to pilgrimage to Canterbury, which was the main tourist attraction of the day, particularly the shrine of St Thomas a'Becket.

We have links to Thomas a'Becket in this area. The church at Tilshead is dedicated to him. There is an A'Becket chapel in All Saints, West Lavington. And, of course, our local vineyard is at A'Beckett's Littleton Panell. I am not sure how we connect but, apparently, Thomas did stay at Ivychurch Priory near Salisbury, which had a link with Tilshead.

Most interestingly, for me, is the fact that Chaucer's characters are so like people we can all recognise now. One difference is that, in those times, the world was getting cooler following the Medieval Warm Period of the previous century. And, of course, we are not fighting a Hundred Years War with France.

Edington Arts 2021

With the government's Roadmap out of lockdown now underway, we are very hopeful that we can restart our concert programme in Edington Priory Church. All our events this year will be offered under whatever Covid guidelines are in place at the time, and will be made as safe and welcoming as possible.

The first concert will be at 7.30pm on **Saturday 12th June**. This is a change from the date we had to give you in the March issues of all the Parish magazines (early deadlines meant we had to submit copy before the Roadmap announcement.)

So, we are absolutely delighted to be able to announce that our first performers of 2021 will be the internationally renowned brass quintet **Fine Arts Brass**. Consisting of two trumpets, trombone, french horn and tuba, they were founded in 1980, and have toured over 60 countries, commissioned over 50 new works, broadcast on BBC Radios 2, 3, and 4 and much else besides. They have a repertoire which ranges from baroque to swing and everything in between. This year is the 100th anniversaries of both Malcolm Arnold and Astor Piazzolla, so works by both composers will form part of an exciting programme.

There will be few better ways of celebrating a return to live music in person, but we will still be under some form of seat limitation. Therefore tickets, which will go on sale in late April, will be tied to specific seats in the church. We are anticipating strong demand and will be operating a waiting list. Do check our website www.edingtonarts.org for updated information, and we look forward to seeing you.

Worton Parish Council

As I write this update on the latest musings and decisions of your Parish Council we live in hope of a life that soon will give us a bit more normality back - it's now been so long that I for one, am far from sure what that will actually mean in practice. There is still so much uncertainty, but one thing is for sure -longer days will bring certain sunshine for us all to enjoy in our lovely village!

Our response to the Local Plan review has now been submitted - the discussion which surrounded it having taken up the majority of the duration of our March meeting. It is likely that this consultation will prove to be of limited long term relevance for a variety of reasons, but we felt it was important to consider our response very carefully in order to put a "marker" out there that reflects the views, aspirations and needs of our village the best we can.

The full transcript of our response is available to read on our website, but in summary we wanted to keep as much control as we can over the issues that we anticipate will need to be dealt with. Top of the list, as is often the case, was future housing development. The review, as it stood, placed us in a possible position of needing to provide possibly 40 more houses within the next ten years or so, which was a figure arrived at by one of those mysterious "algorithms" we are becoming accustomed to. As a council we felt that the methodology used was flawed, which we made clear in our response.

A conundrum that has re-emerged as we have considered the complexities of the documentation in support of the Local plan review is our designation as a "large" village, as this makes a tangible difference to what is expected of us in terms of the future role we will play within the local and regional contexts. The designation of "large" is not simply based on population size and geographical dimensions. It also considers the services and facilities available, primarily for the local population, but also, potentially, for those who live outside the boundary. We are continuing to discuss whether we should seek to be re-designated as a small village (there are local examples of designated "small" villages which have considerably more people and facilities than Worton). As we consider this we will thoroughly consider just what being a "large" rather than

"small" village may mean in the future and how the designation could impact on the future of our village and our community as we emerge from the COVID crisis.

One bit of positive news to report that you may well have noticed is the further improvement that has taken place on the new section of the footpath on Back Lane which now has an excellent surface to meet the needs of the wide range of users of the footpath. We need to thank Anne Dunham whose persistence in raising the issue has really paid off. We are lucky to have people like Anne in our community. We await developments on another section of the path close to the church that we referred to last month.

Incidentally, the sapling planted near to the cedar tree in Cedar Close is NOT its replacement. It is replacing another tree in the close which recently had to be removed -the original location being no longer suitable. We still await news on the removal date for the Cedar Tree so there may still be an opportunity for those of you who are interested to secure for yourself a small piece of history (or maybe not so small - it's a very big tree!). Please let Liz Starling know using the usual channels.

We are tentatively considering that our July meeting might see a return to normality in the form of face to face contact, but, in the meantime, we will continue to operate in "virtual" format. Let's all keep focussed and hopefully we can get back together properly soon.

Prim and Keith Wright

Congratulations to Prim and Keith Wright on reaching their 60th Wedding Anniversary, which they celebrated quietly on the 25th March. They received a message from Her Majesty and video calls from family and friends, near and far.

Prim and Keith were married at St Mary's Church Potterne, on a sunny but not too cold day and later that afternoon, took the train from Devizes to London before heading off to honeymoon in Austria.

The happy couple met on an October evening in 1959, at the Corn Exchange in Devizes, when Keith Wright, a young Sergeant in the Army Pay Corps, asked Primrose, a local Potterne girl, for a dance. It was just three weeks before the end of Keith's National Service after which, he returned home to his native Yorkshire. They wrote to each other constantly before Prim ventured north at Christmas to meet Keith's family for the very first time. During the course of the following year, Keith frequently travelled back down to Wiltshire to be with his new love; such a long journey by train in those days. Worton and Marston Gardening Club

Now Spring has arrived bringing us some normal Spring weather; a couple of warmer days, a bit of sunshine and frosty mornings, and more recently three or four days of gales with periods of rain and the occasional bit of sunshine. UPDATE ON THE PROPOSED CLOSURE OF FURLONG

UPDATE ON THE PROPOSED CLOSURE OF FURLONG CLOSE, ROWDE

As your readers may be aware, in October last year, Hft announced that it had reached a joint decision with Wiltshire Council to evict the vulnerable residents of Furlong Close in Rowde, close the site and sell off the land for housing development. The shocked families of the residents, who had not been consulted, asked to talk to Hft and the Council about this terrible decision, but were told it was "a done deal".

Many of the vulnerable residents (who suffer from a range of learning disabilities including Down syndrome, autism and epilepsy) have lived at Furlong Close for more than 20 years. My cousin, David, is one of those residents. David and the other residents have formed lifelong friendships at Furlong Close and developed close relationships with their carers, whom they know and trust and who provide them with kind and professional care. The residents' disabilities make change very stressful for them. Breaking up their happy community and forcibly uprooting them from their settled home at Furlong Close, to scatter them to new and strange places in towns like Trowbridge and Chippenham, will be traumatic and distressing for them. In some cases, that trauma will be life-shortening. The residents are happy in Rowde and are well integrated into community life in the village, where they attend church, frequent the local pubs and cafes and have part-time work. They do not want to leave their

settled home and they and their families are in despair at the prospect that they will be forced to do so.

All of this is made all the more cruel by the fact that there is no good reason why Furlong Close should be closed. The Care Quality Commission gives the site high marks for meeting the residents' needs and for treating them with "compassion, kindness, dignity and respect". The CQC's most recent report on Furlong Close (from April 2020) described Furlong Close as having "a very happy family atmosphere" and observed that the residents "are very caring of each other" and are "living a full and active life in a caring and safe environment".

Hft and the Council, however, say that the community model of care provided by Furlong Close is "outmoded" and, on that basis, want to break up this longstanding and happy community and disperse the residents to live a lonely existence in small flats in Trowbridge and Chippenham. This is unnecessary and cruel. The residents and their families deserve better.

Since that decision in October, the local community has rallied around the residents and their families. Our petition — https://www.change.org/p/hft-and-wiltshire-council-stop-the-closure-of-hft-in-rowde— has gathered an amazing 43,000 signatures from all over Wiltshire and beyond. The residents and their families and friends are extremely grateful to your readers and the local community for that support, which succeeded in getting the closure decision deferred from its original date of June 2021. The closure decision, however, has NOT been withdrawn and Furlong Close remains slated for closure.

The families continue to fight for Furlong Close to be saved and are optimistic that this will be achieved. In recent weeks, there have been some profoundly disturbing developments, but there is also a ray of hope.

The most extraordinary and disturbing of these recent developments is that, on 15 February, the CEO of Hft, Kirsty Matthews, wrote to Wiltshire Council, giving notice under its contracts with the Council. That notice expires on 19 May 2021. Hft has also an-

nounced its intention to withdraw altogether from the provision of care services in Wiltshire.

In explaining why it has taken this dramatic step, Hft's CEO has said that the Council's conduct has made any commercial relationship between it and Hft "untenable". Hft says that the Council, in saying publicly that it was Hft alone which decided to close Furlong Close, "has lied about the commitments and decisions the Council made to Hft". Hft says that, far from being uninvolved in that decision, the Council was in fact the moving party behind it and that, in denying this, the Council is "backpedaling" and trying to "hide behind" Hft. Even more disturbing, in the same letter, Hft's CEO also says that Hft has "witnessed significant breaches by the Council of its statutory duties towards the service users at Rowde, which it is not prepared to be associated with".

Unsurprisingly, allegations by a major, reputable national charity (HRH Princess Anne is its patron) that Wiltshire Council has "lied" about its role in the closure decision and breached its statutory duties towards the residents of Furlong Close have given rise to calls for an independent inquiry into the conduct of the Council. On 23 February, the leader of Wiltshire Council, Philip Whitehead, ordered an internal, rapid scrutiny exercise, but this has now been shelved. The result is that these accusations will remain hanging over the head of the Council as Wiltshire voters go to the polls to elect their new Council in May.

All of this has been bad news for the residents and their families, as Hft's giving notice means that the clock is now ticking towards 19 May, when the termination of Hft's contract to provide care at Furlong Close takes effect.

Fortunately, however, Hft has offered the Council the opportunity to bring in a new operator and lease the site for at least two years. This would avert the catastrophe and trauma of a closure later this year, and give the families the time to find a long-term solution to save Furlong Close for its current and future residents. But that offer has now been sitting on the table for four weeks while, instead of saving Furlong Close for its residents, Hft and the Council have busied themselves writing lawyer's letters to each other.

We need the help of your readers, to press Wiltshire Council and Hft to do this deal, save Furlong Close for at least two years and avoid the trauma and distress that will be suffered if the residents are forced to leave. While Hft and the Council prevaricate, vulnerable and innocent people are suffering and we are calling for decisive action.

If your readers would like to help us, can they please do two things:

Email the Leader of Wiltshire Council, Philip Whitehead and the CEO of Hft, Kirsty Matthews and urge them to work together urgently to save Furlong Close; at

Press your local candidates standing for Council about what they are going to do to save Furlong Close, and don't be fobbed off with waffle about "having discussions" or "keeping people updated" or "staying in touch".

Thank you to the people of Wiltshire for their continuing support for the vulnerable residents of Furlong Close.

May 2021 Elections

On 6 May 2021, all eligible residents in Wiltshire will be invited to vote in a number of elections and referendums.

The Police and Crime Commissioner elections, Town and parish elections, Unitary elections, and ten local Neighbourhood planning referendums will all be taking place.

Wiltshire Council's top priority is for you to have your say in a safe way.

Further information is available on their website: www.wiltshire.gov.uk/Elections-2021

It is important that you are **registered to vote** so that you can have your say.

Vote by post if you can: The deadline to register for a postal vote for the 6 May elections is 5pm on 20 April 2021.

Polling stations: All polling stations will be COVID-secure, with full risk assessments carried out.

How is Worton Parish Council affected?

All existing councillors cease to be councillors and will have to be nominated for election if they wish to stand again for the next term (2021-2025)

Are there specific dates I should know about?

Yes, a timetable of relevant and specific dates can be found at: https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/media/4911 but if you are thinking of standing for election your nomination must be in by 8 April.

Can anyone be elected to the Parish Council?

To be able to stand for election (or co-option) to a local council, an individual must meet certain qualifications (by law). They must be:

- Over 18 and a UK, Commonwealth, ROI, or EU Citizen and
- An elector for the parish, or
- For the last 12 months, have occupied land or premises in the parish, or

• Work in the parish (principal or only place of work), or

- Live within 3 miles of the parish boundary Someone cannot stand for election, if at the time of their nomination and on polling day:
- They are employed by the parish/community council or hold a paid office under the parish/community council (including joint boards or committees).
- They are the subject of a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order.
- They have been sentenced to a term of imprisonment of three months or more (including a suspended sentence), without the option of a fine, during the five years before polling day.
- They have been disqualified under the Representation of the People Act 1983 (which covers corrupt or illegal electoral practices and offences relating to donations). a person has been reported guilty by an election court or convicted and lasts for five years.

How are candidates nominated?

There is guidance for candidates and nomination forms at https://bit.ly/38CSxkr

Candidates should also be advised to check the relevant principal authority website:

www.wiltshire.gov.uk/Elections-2021

Candidates need to have two subscribers (a proposer and a seconder) and will need to advise them that they will require their Electoral Register number and how it will be used (for GDPR purposes). This information will be in the nomination form and candidate pack.

Nomination papers have to be delivered in person. Wiltshire Council is encouraging appointments to do this and has created a booking system – see www.wiltshire.gov.uk/elections-town-parish for details.

Will a poll take place for the local council election?

It depends. If, by 8th April only the same number, or fewer candidates than there are seats on the council have been nominated, they will be elected unopposed. If there are more candidates than there are seats on the council – it will go to the poll on 6th May. 

Almost everything you do releases an amount of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. For example the food we eat accounts for 20-30% of our annual household carbon footprint. The emissions come from the processes involved in the production and transport of our food. (Ref: Climate Stewards https://www.climatestewards.org/reduce/). Reducing the amount of meat that you eat and where possible eating locally grown, unprocessed food will reduce your carbon footprint. Choosing a renewable electricity provider will significantly reduce your carbon footprint.

The Climate Change Act 2008 established a target for the UK to reduce it emissions by at least 80% from the 1990 level by 2050. In 2019, following the Paris Agreement, the target was changed to netzero by 2050 ie 100% reduction in emissions. According to the Committee on Climate Change, in 2016 household emissions of $\rm CO_2$ accounted for 40% of all UK emissions. In 2016 the average UK household's emissions were 12.19 tonnes - this includes the impact of housing, heating, diet, transport and lifestyle.

If you would like to estimate your household's carbon footprint the WWF has a quick and fun way to calculate this which will show you how your emissions compare to the average person in the UK: https://footprint.wwf.org.uk/#/

Once you know how big your carbon footprint is, you can think about areas where you can reduce or eliminate aspects of your household's emissions. Those things which cannot be eliminated can

be offset by compensating financially for your emissions. Carbon offsetting schemes invest in environmental projects around the world. The money you give to offset your CO₂ emissions is used to support climate friendly initiatives in the developing world such as tree planting in Kenya and smokeless stoves in Nepal. Climate Stewards provide some really helpful suggestions about how you can reduce your carbon emissions and a simple route to offset the rest.

Speakers in the morning session were Minette Batters (Wiltshire farmer and President of the NFU), Emma Dawnay (economist and Green Party candidate for Devizes in 2019), Joe Brindle (a student leading a national campaign to have climate science fully taught in schools), Lt. General Richard Nugee (Ministry of Defence lead on climate change), Richard Clewer (Deputy Leader of Wiltshire Council), Tim Wade (local farmer), Louisa Davidson (Climate Change Lobby), Juliet Davenport (founder of Good Energy), Graham Martin (Sustainable Devizes), Jemma Batten (an agrienvironmental consultant) and Evangeline Rowe (Wiltshire Climate Alliance Youth Group).

Some 400 local farmers, business people, students, activists and other concerned residents attended the Summit to learn about the issues and to voice their views regarding what can be done, locally and nationally, to combat climate change. Polls were conducted for each speaker to gauge the views of the audience.
