ALL residents of Worton and Marston as well as members of the Worton and Marston Gardening Club are eligible to enter the show.

All children with a connection to the villages, the Club or the school are eligible to enter.

Every person wishing to exhibit must submit an entry form, found in the middle of this programme to the organising committee on or before Wednesday 30th August along with the appropriate entry fees.

All flower, fruit and vegetable exhibits MUST be grown by the exhibitor and be his or her own property.

All entries in Flower Section should be displayed in a container.

Exhibits must be delivered to the Village Hall between 9 a.m. and 10.30 a.m. on the day of the show. No exhibit will be accepted after 10.30 a.m. on the day of the show.

The committee will not be held responsible for any loss or damage and entries will only be accepted on this understanding.

Exhibits must not be removed before the close of the show. Red dots will be available from the committee for exibitors to identify those exhibits they wish to remove at the end of the show.

The committee's decision shall be final in all matters except the allocation of prizes which shall be left to the discretion of the judges whose decision shall also be final.

Exhibitors will be restricted to one entry per class.

Points will be awarded in each class on the basis of three for 'FIRST', two for 'SECOND' and one for 'THIRD'. The Club Champion will be determined by adding the points awarded from the Vegetable, Flower, Fruit and Biggest sections. The Show Champion will be determined by adding the points awarded from the Vegetable, Flower, Fruit and Home Produce sections.

In the event of a tie on points gained in each class, the final positions will be decided on the basis of the number of first places, and if equal on the number of first places, the final positions will be decided on the number of second places.



RECIPE FOR TEA BREAD

INGREDIENTS: 80Z. MIXED DRIED FRUIT.

6 FLUID OZ. WARM STRAINED TEA.

40Z. DARK SOFT BROWN SUGAR.

80Z. SELF-RAISING FLOUR.

1 EGG - BEATEN.

HALF A TEASPOON OF MIXED SPICES.

SOAK THE FRUIT IN THE TEA FOR SEVERAL HOURS IN A COVERED BOWL. LINE A 2LB LOAF TIN. HEAT THE OVEN TO 325F (160C) GAS MARK 3.

ADD THE REMAINING INGREDIENTS TO THE FRUIT AND BEAT WELL. THE MIXTURE SHOULD BE OF A SLIGHTLY WET CONSISTENCY.

POUR INTO THE LOAF TIN AND BAKE FOR ONE HOUR, OR UNTIL COOKED. LEAVE IN THE TIN FOR A FEW MINUTES BEFORE TURNING OUT. THIS CAKE IMPROVES WHEN STORED IN A TIN FOR A FEW DAYS.

Worton and Marston Village Show 2023 - Guidance notes

To all potential entrants to the show, the schedule contains basic information for each class in the show. Where classes are marked with an asterisk, you will find further helpful quidance in these notes.

Whilst we hope that our show attracts gardeners, cooks and crafters, young and old, we want everyone to feel they can take part so please give it a go.

Vegetable section

The general idea is that in most of the classes, the items displayed should be similar in size and shape but please do not dig up a whole row of carrots to find three identical. Vegetables should be clean but not polished. Onions should have a layer of brown skin. Beetroot should be no larger than a tennis ball. If your beans are not quite straight, wrap them carefully in a damp tea towel for a few hours.

Flower section

Classes 18 and 19. You can remove one or two of the bottom blooms off the stem of the gladioli if they have gone over a little.

Classes 20, 21, 22. In each class, three blooms of the same variety is ideal but not essential. Decorative dahlias refer to the large dinner plate style, with blooms 6" or larger.

Please note if the class identifies blooms or stems, blooms are single, stems can have multiple blooms.

Class 32, the flower arrangement, max. 25cm width, 25cm depth, unlimited height. This will be judged from the front on artistic merit. Any plant material may be used – fresh or dried. Accessories and titles allowed. Fresh plant material must be in water. Plant material must predominate.

Home produce section

Paper plates will be available for display.

Entries in all classes except 59 will be tasted by the judges. As well as taste, produce will be judged on appearance, colour, texture and bake.

In those classes with four slices, they should be of similar size and appearance (classes 52,54,58)

Advice for sealing jams and chutneys. Lids of any jars should NOT be re-used. The best alternative is the traditional use of a wax disc, placed when the jam is warm and a cellophane top stretched over and attached with an élastic band. New jar tops or clean plastic snap on lids can be used.

In all jam and chutney classes, the jar should have details of the product inside and when made.

The biggest section

This too should be self explanatory. By nature a number of the exhibits will be knobbly and ugly, please can they be washed as much as possible.

Class 76 The Geranium exhibit. The Gardening Club members were all given a small geranium plant in May and encouraged to take it home, feed it, lavish love, pot it on several times until it has grown to a beautiful, healthy looking, floriferous creature ready for the show.

Class 77 A mixed planter up to 18" in diameter containing up to 6 plant varieties.
